Synnestvedt studied music and dance in Philadelphia as a child. She went on to study at the Juilliard School in New York City; Syracuse University in Syracuse, N.Y.; and the University of Iowa in Iowa City, Iowa. She also studied for four summers at Tanglewood in Massachusetts. Synnestvedt's organ teachers included Vernon de Tar, Arthur Poister and Gerhard Krapf. Synnestvedt has performed from coast to coast as well as in England. She currently resides on Chicago's North Shore where she teaches piano, organ, and voice privately and also serves as assistant organist and choirmaster at Christ Episcopal Church, Winnetka, Ill.

**\*\*August 19: Bruce Bengtson of Madison, Wis.**

Bengtson is director of music at Luther Memorial Church, Madison. He plays a weekly noon-time concert during the nearby University of Wisconsin's academic year. Bengtson is active in the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, for which he is immediate past-president of the Midwest region, and the American Guild of Organists. He has two commissioned anthems published by Augsburg Fortress.

Steely serves as minister of music at historic First Lutheran Church, Moline, and organist at Temple Emanuel, Davenport, Iowa, and St. Pius X Church, Rock Island, Ill. ## Volunteers needed for the Dubuque Area Weatherization Challenge

On Saturday, October 24, volunteer weatherization teams will spread out across the Dubuque community in a one-day blitz to perform energy saving measures on the homes of their elderly or disabled neighbors. Teams will provide simple weatherization measures such as caulking, weather-stripping, window plastic, door sweeps and other insulating techniques. All materials are provided. The service is FREE for homeowners.

**Dubuque Area Congregations United (DACU) is one of the official sponsors of this event and is encouraging all congregations to participate.**

There is no cost to participate. The tasks are easy but they will make a positive difference for the homeowner in comfort and reduced energy bills. You don't need to be skilled. Just have a willingness to help others. Training is provided for those who are interested.

**There are a number of ways to participate:**

- 1) Recruit a six-member team from your church. **Register on-line at [www.thonline.com/weatherization](http://www.thonline.com/weatherization).** Please register by August 1, if at all possible so that we can determine the number of households we can serve.
- 2) Help identify and refer households. They should be homeowners who are either elderly, handicapped, disabled or otherwise unable to do these things for themselves.
- 3) Volunteer to help with set up and clean up on the day of the event.

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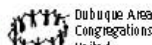
